STRATEGIC PLAN

Introduction

The Department of Architecture embarked on Strategic Planning in fall 2013. The last Strategic Plan had been made in 2006 and there was consensus that it was time for a new planning effort that would cover both short and long range planning for the future. The NAAB Visiting Team Report following the team visit in March 2013 found that the requirement for long-range planning (Condition A. I.1.4) for both the B.Arch. and M.Arch. programs had not been met, which added to the need for new strategic planning. It was also agreed, that with a strong accreditation report and a new eight-year term of accreditation, this would be a good time to start a planning process that could lead to curricular and other structural changes.

The effort was begun in September 2013, in a day and a half long faculty retreat in which the group as a whole and smaller break-out groups discussed strengths and challenges of the department, as well as recommended actions. There was general agreement on both strengths and challenges.

Strengths

- Long and distinguished history, producing highly respected graduates who have made a significant impact on the professions of Architecture and Interior Architecture.
- · Active and productive faculty with a strong research profile
- Long history as the leading Architecture program in sustainable design
- Students actively engaged in faculty research
- Strong in designing with meaning, social depth, human experience

Challenges

- Funding, as it impacts faculty support for research, student support (GTFs), department office staffing, Eugene facility upgrades
- Maximizing Portland potential
- · Bringing established and active design professionals to Eugene
- Need for curricular updates

A large number of suggested action items emerged from the discussions and the faculty decided that in order to prioritize them we needed further discussion. We agreed to form two committees, one focused on Research and Curriculum and the other focused on Outreach and Dissemination, that would meet in the fall term 2013 and report back to the faculty as a whole in winter.

In early winter 2014, the faculty had a meeting with robust discussion based on the presentations made by the two committees. There was a wide-ranging discussion about the profession and about what we should be teaching students and doing ourselves. We agreed that while we needed to continue faculty discussions, that it would be useful to seek feedback from external focus groups.

In winter 2014, we conducted focus group sessions with the following groups:

Emerging professionals/recent graduates of the architecture programs

- Professionals at the February Career Fair
- Adjunct professional faculty
- · Heads of large Portland architecture firms
- Recent interior architecture graduates
- Heads of Portland interior architecture firms

We asked the focus groups about what they thought about the current and future state of the profession, what they thought architectural education should be focusing on, and what they thought were our programs' strengths and weaknesses. The results of these focus groups were remarkably consistent. We heard that we should:

- Teach students diverse communication skills (verbal, both hand and digital graphics, modeling, and simulation techniques)
- Introduce more interdisciplinary and collaborative courses and experiences
- Address large-scale, contemporary projects and issues

We brought student leaders into the faculty discussion and worked with the AIAS to put out a survey to the student body in spring 2014. There was broad student participation in the survey and the central issues that emerged largely paralleled the ones raised in the focus groups. The students favored:

- More sustainability education
- More interdisciplinary coursework in both studios and other classes
- More collaborative design work
- More linkage of design communications to studio
- More digital media
- More real works studio projects (and some slight favoring of more speculative/theory projects)

The faculty met and discussed the results of the focus groups and the student survey in late spring 2014. What was clear to the faculty was that we needed to focus on a number of curricular issues:

- Diverse communications skills, including digital media
- More interdisciplinary and collaborative education opportunities
- More real world projects, better and more contemporary design work
- More connection between studios and other courses, especially integrating sustainability

At this faculty meeting there was some endorsement for the idea of change in general, and, in particular, in updating the curriculum.

In September 2014 we had a second faculty retreat focusing on strategic planning. In a group of the whole, we reviewed and discussed the results of the NAAB VTR, our own discussions, the focus groups and student surveys. We then broke into four smaller groups to discuss and make proposals for addressing:

- Restructuring and updating the curriculum for both undergraduate and graduate programs
- Prioritization of existing and new programs: best and highest use of Portland program (urban setting, multidisciplinary urban design credentials, Yeon Center, access to

- professionals as adjuncts, student internships, hosting international and US groups, especially in summer, new Master of Urban Design degree and possible new M.S. programs); prioritization of study abroad and design/build programs.
- Support of research and creative practice: support for Centers and Labs; support for additional graduate fellowships and graduate program enhancement.
- Strategic partnerships (industry and academic partners at UO and elsewhere, including international and Oregon State University) and recruiting opportunities (competitions, symposia, career fairs, website).

A number of specific proposals came out of these discussions. Some of these were already moving ahead and others were starting in the coming year. However, since the department would be undergoing a University Program Review in 2014-15, we decided to finalize the Strategic Plan after the University Program Review Committee visited the department and made their report to Academic Affairs, and after a discussion with Academic Affairs about the report.

The University Program Review external committee visited the department in winter 2015. Their report was generally very positive, noting many strengths of the department, as well as a number of short and long term opportunities and challenges. Many of these paralleled our own findings and reinforced what we thought would be our priorities. Even before reviewing the report with Academic Affairs, the School of Architecture and Allied Arts Dean's office acted on several of the more urgent recommendations of the external committee, as did the university. Other recommendations are continuing to be discussed and addressed.

The faculty met for another retreat in September 2015. At this retreat we finalized and approved (by nearly unanimous vote – there was one abstention) a strategic plan for the department. The Plan includes Goals, Actions and Timeline (for each action). We noted where many of the actions had already begun and where others were planned to start and found that we were already moving forward with many aspects of the plan that had resulted from this two year long planning process. We hope to be able to make further progress in the coming years.
