**Course description**: Evolution is defined as the change in allele frequencies in populations. Population genetics explores how allele frequencies change in populations over time by modeling the four main evolutionary forces - natural selection, genetic drift, mutation and gene flow. This course aims to provide students with an understanding of the history of the field of population genetics, the evolutionary forces that shape the genetic composition of populations, and foundational models and concepts at the heart of this field. This goal is accomplished through a combination of lectures, readings from textbooks and the primary literature, and problem solving.

#### **Learning Objectives:**

- Become aware of what population genetics is, its connection to our lives, and its importance for the scientific and public communities
- Gain foundational knowledge for key models in population genetics
- Develop working knowledge of types of approaches used to interrogate population genetic questions in natural populations
- Develop understanding of how to interpret population genetic data and connect these data to biological concepts and evolutionary forces acting in natural populations

## Reporting

The instructor of this class is an Assisting Employee. As such, if you disclose to me, I will respond to you with respect and kindness. I will listen to you, and will be sensitive to your needs and desires. I will not judge you. I will support you. As part of that support, I will direct students who disclose sexual harassment or sexual violence to resources that can help. Safe Ride is an **assault prevention shuttle** that works to provide free, inclusive, and accessible alternatives to traveling alone at night for **UO students**, **faculty**, **and staff**.

We are a schedule-ahead service and riders can (1) call once we open to schedule a ride with a dispatcher or (2) leave a voicemail on the day of their ride request. We do not call riders ahead of time to confirm due to capacity constraints, but riders are always welcome to call us to double-check that their ride was scheduled. We are a feminist, 'for-the-students' organization and operate out of the Women's Center in EMU 12F.
