Course Description

This course introduces you to the role of cultural and sociocultural influences on mental health and psychopathology. You will learn about research and clinical implications of culture, race, and ethnicity, on diagnosis, psychological assessment, and psychotherapy, and on mental health issues specific to ethnic groups of color in the United States. Although there will be some attention to international research, the focus will be on the U.S. because of the large amount of research on U.S. populations and because most students will live and work in the U.S.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- 1. Evaluate the adequacy of the mainstream mental health literature in addressing cultural diversity and identify gaps in this literature.
- 2. Identify major theories, research findings, and methodological approaches in culture and mental health and apply research findings to human behavior in everyday life.

ASSIGNMENTS

Class Participation

Class meetings are intended to promote understanding of and engagement with the course material beyond what you can achieve by completing the assigned readings. Class participation will be worth 25% of your grade. Class meetings will consist of lectures and self-reflection activities. Accordingly, class participation will be evaluated in two ways: (1) lecture attendance; and (2) self-reflection summaries.

Lecture attendance (15%): In each class meeting, we will ask you to respond to one or more multiple-choice or short-answer questions. This will allow us to assess your understanding of the material and track attendance. Your responses to the questions do not need to be correct to receive credit. If a significant number of students do not answer correctly, then we will review the question further. Per our absence policy, students who attend at least 85% of class meetings will receive full credit for lecture attendance.

Self-reflection summaries (10%): Developing multicultural competence as a psychologist requires continual self-reflection. To build this practice, we will ask you to engage in self-reflection during class meetings. Within one week after each class meeting, you should post a brief (2-4 sentences) summary of your self-reflection to the Canvas course site.

Examinations

There will be three examinations. These exams are designed to assess your understanding and to facilitate learning and retention of the material. Each exam will be 25 multiple-choice questions. The third exam will cover the last section of the course and will not be cumulative. Each exam will be worth 25% of your grade.

Examples of possible exam questions will be reviewed in class. Exam questions will be based on all of the material in the lectures as well as content from the textbook and readings. Exam questions will be split evenly between the lectures and textbook/readings. Students must answer from memory and cannot use notes, outlines, papers, etc.

You will have the whole class period for the examinations. There will not be a lecture on the days of the examinations.

Students who experience extenuating circumstances at the time of an exam can make alternative arrangements <u>before</u> the exam. Make-up exams may be essay questions.

Extra Credit

There will be two opportunities to earn extra credit. You can earn 0.5% extra credit to your final grade if at least 90% of the class completes the midway student experience survey. You can earn another 1% extra credit to your final grade if at least 90% of the class completes the end-of-term student experience survey.

COURSE POLICIES

Course Modality
