Course description and expected learning outcomes

This term the course is devoted specifically to developing first-year-project or master's thesis presentations. Our first session we'll check in and get organized for the term. Our second meeting will be about designing effective data visualizations. In the remaining weeks, you will give two presentations about your research to the class. You will receive substantive feedback on the content of your presentation and skills feedback on your presentation strategy. Providing structured feedback to others in the class will also help you develop your skills as a colleague and mentor.

Learning goals:

- · Improve your skills at communicating effectively about research
- Improve your skills at providing constructive feedback to peers
- Make progress in designing a clear, informative, and engaging FYP or master's thesis presentations

Workload

This course is worth one credit, or 30 hours for the term. Half of that is spent in class. The other half consists of preparation of slides and talking points for your two in-class presentations.

Grading

This is a one-credit, pass/no-pass seminar. Your grade will be based on attendance and satisfactory, timely completion of assignments. Because the university mandates a universal attendance and late work policy, note that you can miss up to three assignments or days (e.g. absent two days, missed one assignment) of the course and still receive a passing grade, but missing more than three assignments or days total will result in a grade of N (not passing).

Assignments

- 1. **Preparing and revising a presentation.** You will prepare a presentation and give to your team, revise it based on feedback, and present it a second time to the whole class. All presentations must be no longer than 15 minutes.
- 2. **Workshopping with your team.** You will each be assigned to a team of three or four students. In weeks 4 and 5, we will break out into team meetings during class time, and members will take turns presenting to the team. Every team will workshop all other team members' presentations across those two weeks.
- 3. Presenting to the class. In weeks 7 through 10, you will give your presentation to the entire class and receive feedback on it.
- 4. **Written feedback.** Your fellow students depend on your input. A requirement of the course is that starting with week 7 class presentations, you will give written feedback to each speaker using the <u>template here.</u> (https://canvas.uoregon.edu/courses/220856/files/16044650/download?download_frd=1)
