The meeting was called to order at 3:00 pm.

THE NEW SOMD STRUCTURE

The new structure that has been chosen by the faculty will be:

- Dept I: Dance
- Dept II: Composition, Musicology, Theory
- Dept III: Jazz, Music Tech, Music Ed/Music Therapy
- Dept IV: Winds, Brass, Percussion, Bands
- Dept V: Strings/Orchestra, Voice/Choral, Piano

Madison-Cannon acknowledged that change is hard and scary but assured everyone that what we have now doesn't work because *everything* has to pass through the dean's office without or with very little vetting prior to that stop. The FAC worked really, really hard and listened to all concerns. We can't solve everyone's concerns, but this model addresses most issues.

In answers to a few questions raised at the meeting, Idit Shner briefly described the process by which the FAC reached their proposed new structure: through emails, texts, in person meetings; by reading through everything and considering everyone's opinion. For example, a request from conducting to be in the area of their players was accommodated. Madison-Cannon added that music ed encompasses teacher certification, which has an extra level of responsibilities that other area heads don't have. And all departments are relatively the same in population except dance, which is small.

The next step: Planning and implementation committee. Devising department head job duties. Determine if separate governance documents are needed. Maintain compliance with union requirements. In fall 2020, walk into this new structure.

Madison-Cannon noted that she purposefully stayed out of the way of this faculty-driven process. This structure may not be what she would have chosen, but she is ready to stand behind the work of the FAC, saying "There's nothing that we can do that can't be undone if it doesn't work."

In response to questions about how the new structure will affect the promotion and tenure process, Madison-Cannon said that a department head letter will be needed before having the dossier go forward to the SOMD Personnel Committee. Or there could be a department faculty vote, then department head letter, then SOMD PC.

WRAP-UP REPORTS

IT: Guy Eckelberger reported that the email migration is done

Spring 2019 Music Undergrads by the Numbers—currently enrolled. We are now coding students from the beginning to reflect student interests pre degree program:

- 339 music majors, 264 residents, 75 non-resident (includes 15 international students)
- 203 male, 135 female, 1 other
- 237 declared music minors

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 Advising and tracking portfolio has 576 students. The recommended number is 350 per adviser.

Communications. Fyffe stated that Brad Foley was almost the first to respond to request for *Ledger Lines*, and was bested only by Shner.

2019 Website Redesign: Fyffe gave thanks to faculty and their students for participating in focus groups. The redesign goals were:

- Recruit students
- Promote breadth and value of school
- Highlight faculty
- Elevate visibility of dance
- Showcase amazing vibrant community at SOMD and here in Eugene
- Easier to use
- Align branding (SOJC, COE) with what's recently been done with a similar look and feel

Fyffe also gave the following tip on how to translate Website Structure handouts that will be sent along by email: Colored columns are main navigational tabs at the top with dedicated pages for each smaller box. The redesign won't be done by fall term, but please give your feedback before you scatter for the summer.

He further stated that there is a great demand to have the website more visually engaging. Students want to see their future faculty performing or they want to see a sample studio lesson.

And for the scholars who want to promote written products, the faculty bios will be more under your control. Faculty will be co-administrator of their own page, within the format of what a bio page looks like.

The goal is to have the new website up and running by fall 2020.
