

WHY A SORORITY?

Academics

Chapters help support their members' academic goals in many ways, such as sister to sister tutoring, study hours/tables, referrals to campus resources, and minimum GPA requirements. Fun Fact: Students in sororities have a larger average GPA than students not in these organizations.

Sisterhood

This is often a member's favorite aspect of a sorority, as friendships created within this community are meaningful and long lasting. Sisterhood consists of the caring and supportive aspects of members to each other. It doesn't stop at undergrad, as social and professional connections often last long past graduation.







Service

Each member is expected to complete service hours every term, determined by the sorority, Each chapter also does their own philanthropic events to raise money for causes important to each chapter. Members are very passionate about the organization their chapter is partnered with.

Leadership

The Panhellenic Council is the largest women's organization on campus. We put a large emphasis on member leadership growth. Many sorority women participate in sports, honor societies, student government, and hold jobs. In addition, there are many ways to get involved in our own community!

Active

A woman of a sorority who has been formally initiated

Alumna

A past active member that has graduated.

Bid

An invitation to join a sorority

Big Little

A mentorship program where new members are assigned an active member to help guide them in the sorority.

Chapter

A membership unit of a sorority

Dues

cost of joining a sorority, these cover chapter operations, events and activities

Initiation

A ritual where new members are welcomed as active members into the sorority and receive lifelong membership privileges

MRABA

A one year binding agreement signed by PNMs on the last day of recruitment (see pg 24)

New Member

A period of time directly after a member accepts a bid from the chapter before they are initiated

Panhellenic Council

The governing body of all 11 sororities at the University of Oregon





Pledge

Used as a verb, not a noun. when new members verbally agree to join the sorority

Potential New Member (PNM)

A woman interested in becoming a sorority member through the process of recruitment

Preference

The final round of recruitment, where ultimately a PNM selects a preference for which sorority they want

Primary Recruitment

Implemented and managed by Panhellenic, refers to organized sorority events for the purpose of getting new members.

Recruitment Counselor

An disaffiliated member of the Panhellenic community that is there to help PNMs through the recruitment process

SIP - Single Intentional Preference

when a woman only lists one chapter on her MRABA

Sorority

used to refer to all women's membership organizations within the National Panhellenic Conference

Strict Silence

Period of time between recruitment events and bid distribution, there is no contact between PNMs and actives.

Values Based Recruitment

The method of which every sorority recruits: based on conversations (see page 24)

Yapp App

App you can use that will have information about the chapters.

Interfraternity Council

The Interfraternity Council (IFC) at the University of Oregon represents a total of 16 chapters with over 1,300 members on campus. Since 1900, this community of leadership driven members aim to promote wellness, community involvement, and academic excellence at the University of Oregon. The Interfraternity Council is recognized as a representative community of men of the University of Oregon.





MultiCultural Greek Council

The Multicultural Greek Council (MSFC) includes Latinx and Jewish-interest Fraternity and Sorority chapters. Our Multicultural Council at the University of Oregon promotes diversity and inclusivity within the Fraternity and Sorority community. The MSFC community also encourages students to use their voices to create a positive change on campus and advocate for awareness about cultural diversity.

National Pan-hellenic Council

The University of Oregon is proudly home to 6 National Pan-Hellenic Council Organizations (NPHC). The National Pan-Hellenic Council is the organization that consists of nine historically Black, Greek letter organizations, often referred to as the "Divine Nine." At the University of Oregon, our NPHC community promotes brotherhood and sisterhood in which all of our organization's encourage academic excellence and ethical standards.



Primary Recruitment WHATISIT?



Primary (or formal) recruitment is a five day process where PNMs will get a chance to converse with members from each chapter! There are 4 rounds, and each round PNMs are invited back to less events. As PNMs venture for the right home for them, they will learn about different aspects of the sorority, such as service, philanthropy, sisterhood, their values and more; while chapters also gauge if a PNM is a right fit for them.

WHAT IS IT LIKE?


Recruitment is very structured. Each day, your recruitment counselor will give you your schedule, and you are expected to attend every event listed. At each event, you will be able to casually converse with multiple members from each chapter.

WHAT DO I HAVE TO DO?

Make sure to sign up using the registration link in our Instagram bio before October 1 at 11:59pm. Priority Registration ends September 1, which just means the fee increases \$10 after September 1. Next, make sure to attend your assigned orientation date on October 1, where we will go over important recruitment information and you will meet your recruitment counselors!

This app is helpful for when you make selections. It has the schedule and chapter profiles. It has all the recruitment counselors listed as well.

ICS APP

This app is mandatory during recruitment. This is where you will be making your selections every round (with the exception of preference).

Recruitment Schedule



Sunday, October 1

PNM Orientation

Short orientation where PNMs will learn about the recruitment schedule, what to wear, and basic information about FSL life at UO.

Thursday, October 5

Conversation Day 1

PNMs will visit every chapter in a 30 minute party. This is split up between Thursday and Friday, starting later in the day.

Friday, October 6

Conversation Day 2

PNMs will visit every chapter in a 30 minute party. This is split up between Thursday and Friday, starting later in the day.

Saturday, October 7

Philanthropy Round

PNMs will be invited back to up to 8 chapters in a 40 minute party. This is all day on Saturday.

Sunday, October 8

Membership Experience Round

PNMs will be invited back to up to 6 chapters in a 45 minute party. This is all day on Sunday.

Monday, October 9

Preference Round

PNMs will be invited back to up to 2 chapters in a 60 minute party. This takes place in the evening of Monday.

Tuesday, October 10

Bid Day

PNMs will receive a bid to join a chapter and then become new members, followed by a fun celebration.

Timing

For rounds that happen on school days (conversation days, preference round, and bid day), the parties do not start until the later afternoon. For excusals, Panhellenic will release a form during PNM orientation that you MUST fill out. We cannot guarantee that you will get your excusals, but will try to work around your schedule!

Conversation Day

What To Expect

Also known as Open House, or Convo Day, this is the first round of recruitment. Every PNM will be given the chance to meet every chapter. Conversations are based on getting to know the PNM and basics of sorority life. PNMs will stay with their group and be led by their recruitment counselors.





What To Wear

This is the most casual day of recruitment! Wear good fitting, comfortable shoes (boots, sneakers, sandals) as you will be walking from chapter to chapter. For what to wear, think a cute first day of school outfit.

Make sure to bring a jacket for the night!

GENERAL NOTE:

While we are giving you all inspiration for outfits for recruitment, you do not have to strictly follow this guide! In addition, you are not required to buy all new outfits for recruitment. Use what you have in your closet first and utilize thrift stores!





Philanthropy Round

What To Expect

This is the second round of recruitment.

PNMs will be given the chance to learn about each chapter's national philanthropy, local philanthropy, and philanthropic events each chapters puts on. Conversations are focused around service, values, and leadership.





What To Wear

Philanthropy day is another cute and semiformal dress day. Think about going to a casual interview or going to a nice lunch with friends. This could look like a casual dress, a cute pair of pants, long or short skirts with a nice top.









Membership Experience Round

What To Expect

This is the third round of recruitment.

This includes a tour of the chapter facility (if the chapter has one), a breakdown of finances, and overall conversations about sisterhood. PNMs can expect to talk about values in sisterhoods and experiences within the sorority.





What To Wear

For this round, think of a nice brunch with family and friends. A nice top and pants/skirts with heels and platforms is appropriate, as well as casual dresses. There will be facility tours this day, so make sure to wear shoes you can walk up stairs in, or bring shoes to change into.









Preference Round

What To Expect

This is the last, most personal round of recruitment. PNMs can expect to enjoy an intimate night with up to two sororities. This round may involve songs, a ceremony, or speeches. This is a PNMs last chance to meet with a house before their decision!





What To Wear

The attire for this round is usually dresses (cocktail, sundress or midi/maxi), rompers, and jumpsuits of any color and design. Think of what you would wear to a graduation or a wedding. Heels are definitely popular (but not required), and don't forget to bring a jacket.









Bid Day!!!!

What To Expect

This is known as every actives' and PNMs' favorite day of recruitment. PNMs will be able to open their bids, and then run home to their new sorority! Each sorority has a theme for Bid Day, and it's a fun party with the whole chapter welcoming new members home.





What To Wear

On Bid Day, new members (formally PNMs) will receive a shirt to wear from their chapter. We recommend wearing something easy to change out of on top, such as a tank top, and jeans, skirts, leggings are all good options for the bottoms.









PNM Bill of Rights

As a Potential New Member, you have the right to:

- Be treated as an individual
- Be treated with respect
- be fully informed about the recruitment process
- Have a positive, safe and enriching recruitment and new member experience
- Have inviolable confidentiality when sharing information with recruitment counselors
- Be fully informed about the binding agreement implicit in the preference card signing
- Make your own decision and accept full responsibility for the results of that decision
- ask questions and receive true and objective answers from recruitment counselors
- be treated as a capable and mature person without being patronized
- make informed choices without pressure from active members or anyone else involved in the recruitment process
- not be subjected to competitive recruitment related conversations or situations (i.e. Unethical Recruiting) with active members at any time
- Receive an accurate picture of sorority membership and the obligations associated with it

Any potential new member who experiences something contrary to the above, or Code of Ethics statement should contact their Recruitment Counselor or Panhellenic recruitment staff.



PNM Code of Ethics

Potential New Member Code of Ethics and Agreement of Mutual Respect at University of Oregon College Panhellenic

"We, as Undergraduate Members of women's fraternities, stand ... for maintenance of fine **standards**...for service through the development of character inspired by the close contact and deep **friendship** of individual fraternity and Panhellenic life. The opportunity for wide and wise human service, through **mutual respect and helpfulness**, is the tenet by which we strive to live."

This is accomplished by abiding to the following agreements:

- 1. A potential new member (PNM) shall attend recruitment orientation and all membership recruitment events for which she receives invitations.
- 2. Respect for the membership recruitment process is expected at all times. This includes respect toward chapter members, recruitment counselors, Panhellenic officers, faculty, staff and other potential new members. PNMs should refrain from sexist, homophobic, racist or otherwise abhorrent conversations.
- 3. I understand my rights under the PNM Bill of Rights and if I experience discrimination, I know how to report it to the College Panhellenic.
- 4. Potential new members as well as sorority members must do their best to not touch or shake hands in any way. This helps prevent the spread of illness.
- 5. Membership recruitment is a substance-free process. Women may not use or be in the presence of drugs and alcohol during the membership recruitment period. Violation of this rule will result in immediate removal from the membership recruitment process.
- 6. Potential new members should be fully aware of the financial obligations of membership before accepting a bid. It is to the PNM's advantage to ask questions during recruitment events if there are questions about finances.
- 7. Potential new members agree to treat the chapter videos and recruitment parties as confidential.
- 8. Potential new members will not share any video or recruitment event, including a video in its entirety, or recordings, clips, screen shots, and/or quotes from video or virtual recruitment event.
- 9. Potential new members understand that any breach of this agreement could result to disciplinary action.
- 10. Potential new members understand that if they sign a Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA) after preference round, they are bound to that document and the chapter that extends them a bid. This means that the PNM is ineligible for an invitation to membership from another NPC organization until the next primary recruitment on that campus.

Failure to abide by the expectations stated above will result in the review of your status as a potential new member. The first offense will result in a warning from Panhellenic Recruitment Staff. The second offense will result in being released from the 2023 Panhellenic Recruitment process. If the first offense is determined to be severe enough by the Panhellenic Recruitment Staff, a potential new member could be subject to an immediate release from the Panhellenic Recruitment process.

Let's Talk:

Mutual Selection Process

Recruitment is a mutual selection process that balances the preferences of each potential new member with those of the existing sorority chapters. PNMs will be able to visit each of the chapters during the first round, but rounds 2, 3, and 4 will be based on the preferences of the PNM and the selections of the chapters. There is no guarantee that a PNM will receive a bid to any sorority, however if a PNM attends all the events on preference evening and lists those chapters, they are highly likely to receive a bid from one of those chapters.

Values Based Recruitment

Each chapter under the NPC council engages and follows values based recruiting, where the focus of recruitment falls on the actual conversations that are being held between members and PNMs in accordance with member organizational values. This principle also eliminates all forms of bid promising, oral or written, to join a certain sorority before bids are distributed. Any PNM who feels an active member is not demonstrating values based recruitment should report it to their recruitment counselor immediately.

The MRABA Contract

After a PNM finishes their final event of recruitment on preference evening, PNMs will be given the option to sign the MRABA, Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement. This contract must be signed before a Potential New Member can receive and accept a bid from a sorority. There will be volunteers during selections to support PNMs in fully understanding the MRABA.






SISTERHOOD

TIPS FOR RECRUITMENT

- 1. Take notes after every round! These will be beneficial for when you make selections! You should take notes on the names of the women you talked to, what you talked about, and any other notes.
- Curate your outfits based on comfortability! Not only are you going to be doing a lot of walking (which you should take into account), but wear something you feel confident and comfortable in.
- 3. Come in with questions! What is something you want to know about this chapter?
- 4. Go into each round with one thing you want a chapter to know about you, and don't leave without them knowing!
- 5. Stay true to yourself. Although you may have friends going through the process as well, your experience will be different than theirs, and you will have differing opinions on chapters. That is completely okay!
- 6. Look at each chapter as a whole. The entire chapter is not represented by just one woman.
- 7. Stay positive throughout the process! Recruitment is what you make of it, so don't let a couple thorns ruin the beauty of a rose.
- 8. Make decisions during recruitment based on your own individual experiences and values.
- 9. Get plenty of sleep, drink water and make time to eat. It can be a stressful and fast process, but taking care of yourself is the number one priority.
- 10. Have fun! Recruitment is a great way to get to know people and might be one of the 'most social' six days of your life. I guarantee you will be a different person than when you walked in to your first event. :)

HAZING POLICY



From the State of Oregon: ORS 163.197 - Hazing

- 1) A student organization or a member of a student organization commits the offense of hazing if, as a condition or precondition of attaining membership in the organization or of attaining any office or status in the organization, the organization or member intentionally hazes any member, potential member of person pledged to be a member of the organization.
- 2) (a) A student organization that violates subsection (1) of this section commits a Class A violation. (b) A member of a student organization who personally violates subsection (1) of this section commits a Class B violation.
- 3) Consent of the person who is hazed is not a defense in a prosecution under this section.
- 4) As used in this section:
- (a) "Haze" means: (A) To subject an individual to whipping, beating, striking, branding or electronic shocking, to place a harmful substance on an individual's body or to subject an individual to other similar forms of physical brutality; (B) To subject an individual to sleep deprivation, exposure to the elements, confinement in a small space or other similar activity that subjects the individual to an unreasonable risk of harm or adversely affects the physical health or safety of the individual; (C) To compel an individual to consume food, liquid, alcohol, cannabis, controlled substances or other substances that subject the individual to an unreasonable risk of harm or adversely affect the physical health or safety of the individual; or (D) To induce, cause or require an individual to perform a duty or task that involves the commission of a crime or an act of hazing.
- (b) "Member" includes volunteers, coaches and faculty advisers of a student organization.
- (c) "Student organization" means a fraternity, sorority, athletic team or other organization that is organized or operating on a college, university or elementary or secondary school campus for the purpose of providing members an opportunity to participate in student activities of the college, university or elementary or secondary school. [1983 c.202 §2; 1999 c.1051 §152; 2009 c.493 §1; 2017 c.21 §42]

HAZING POLICY



From the Student Code of Conduct at the University of Oregon Article III - General Misconduct:

h. Hazing: Intentionally subjecting another to a situation or action that a reasonable person would foresee as causing mental or physical discomfort, embarrassment, injury, or ridicule. Individual acceptance of or acquiescence to any activity does not affect a determination of whether the activity constitutes hazing. This includes compelled participation in behavior which would violate the law and/or University Policy. Hazing may include, but is not limited to, sleep deprivation or causing excessive fatigue, physical or psychological shock, compelled ingestion of a substance, and other activities not consistent with the parent organization's rules and regulations.

The University of Oregon Fraternity and Sorority Life does not tolerate hazing. However, the office cannot take action unless it is reported. If you feel an organization is hazing you or someone you know, the best thing you can do is report this. No student should ever feel they have something to prove in order to gain membership. All students in organizations have the right to be treated with respect. Hazing does not promote sisterhood, and does not enhance a member's experience in an organization. Not only is it punishable through the university, but it is also punishable by law. Make the right decisions when you join an organization, and know your own rights!



Do I need to have a minimum GPA to go through recruitment?

No! There is no minimum GPA to join a chapter, however there is a GPA requirement you must uphold as an active/new member!

Can I go through recruitment as a sophomore?

Yes! Recruitment is open for everyone, not just for freshmen.

How much are dues?

Dues vary based on each sorority. During recruitment, PNMs will receive a statement of the financial commitment for each chapter. It is super important that all PNMs understand the finances before committing to join a chapter.

Is there a dress code for recruitment?

No, there is not! The only requirement is to come in an outfit you are confident and comfortable in.

Is PNM orientation mandatory?

Yes! Going to PNM orientation is mandatory to go through the process and will provide necessary information for recruitment.

Should I skip class/Get Explicit for events?

No! Do not skip class or Get Explicit for recruitment. Instead, fill out the excusal form for conflicts.

Am I allowed to know which chapter my recruitment counselor is in?

Not yet... recruitment counselors remain disaffiliated until bid day. They are unbiased sources of recruitment information and advice for you, so use them and listen to them carefully! They are here for you throughout recruitment.
